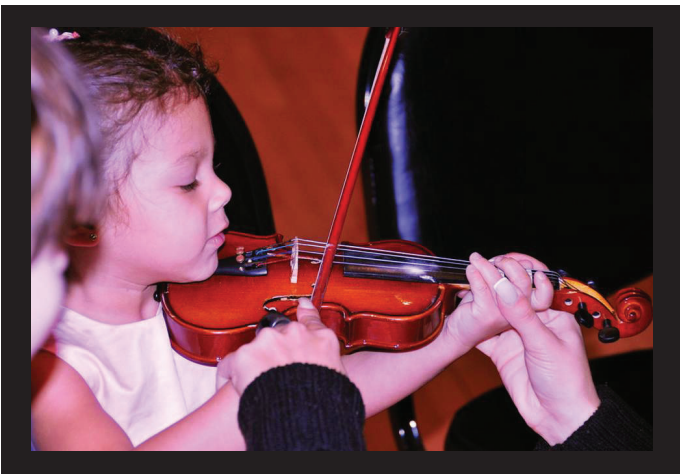
Who are we?

For over 40 years, the CCAC has provided quality one-on-one music lessons and art and drama classes to children who could otherwise not afford it. We serve the St. James Town-Regent Park-Moss Park neighbourhoods of Toronto.

What do we do?

We work predominantly with low-income families, many of whom are new to Canada. We have changed the course of children's lives by providing them with focused, professional individual instruction.

Statistical evidence suggests that children involved with the arts perform better academically. Furthermore, music benefits all aspects of life, improving social skills, and nurturing emotional growth.

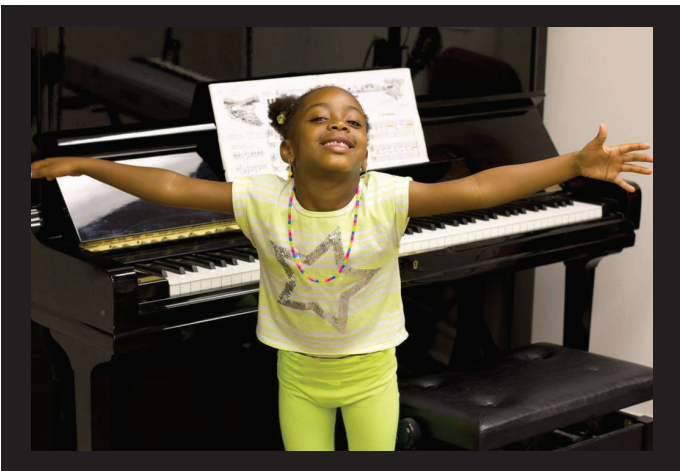
This is especially critical for at-risk children in low income neighbourhoods.

Without you we cannot continue these essential services.

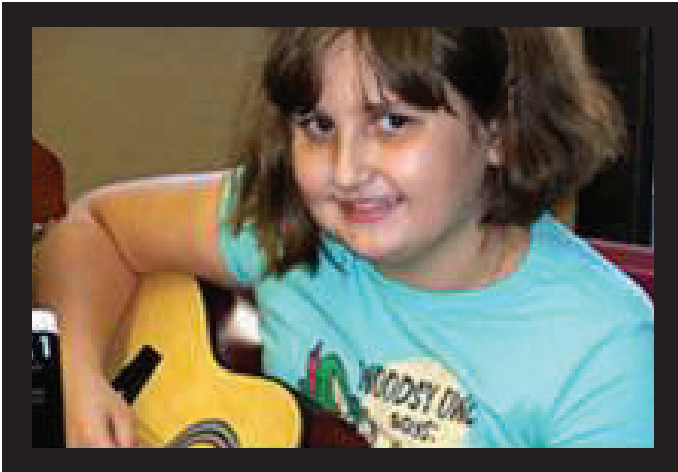

Our Impact on the Neighbourhood

The Cabbagetown Community Arts Centre is a bright, vibrant, welcoming space. We provide a safe, nurturing and artistic environment for at-risk children in some of Toronto's lowest-income communities.

The Centre's music and arts programs are subsidized to insure access for all income levels. No child is excluded. Our programs channel children's energies in positive directions and provide an outlet for their creativity and self-expression. Our group classes foster co-operation, teamwork and cultural awareness. Music recitals, theatre performances, art shows and participation in local events foster family closeness and community pride.

The impact of the CCAC's unique combination of one-on-one and group programs, community events, accessible facilities and central location encourages participation by children in underserved communities separated by social, economic and cultural barriers. It gives them the tools to move forward towards a fulfilling and productive life.

The Science is in! Music instruction...



Boosts Academic Achievement

Adolescents with music training have better cognitive skills and school grades and are more conscientious, open and ambitious. Music improves cognitive and non-cognitive skills more than twice as much as sports, theater or dance.—Sept 2013



Spurs Emotional and Behavioral Growth

Music evolved as a tool that fosters social bonding and group cohesion, increasing socialization and cooperation. Actively making music boosts childrens' socio-emotional learning, aiding in development of self-regulation, self-confidence, leadership and social skills.—July 2015



Strengthens Cognitive Development

Music instruction boosts engagement of cognitive networks that facilitate decision making and the ability to focus attention and inhibit impulses. It accelerates brain development in young children particularly in the areas of the brain that are responsible for processing sound, language development, speech perception and reading skills. Playing a musical instrument also enhances manual dexterity.—Nov 2017



Focuses Attention and Diminishes Anxiety

Playing music acts on the motor areas of the brain, in ways that improve and refine control and coordination of movement. Music practice is associated with cortical thickness which relates to executive functioning, including working memory, attentional control, as well as organization and planning for the future.—Dec 2014



Builds Better Citizens

Young adults who had intensive arts experiences in high school are more likely to show civic-minded behavior than young adults who did not. They take an interest in current affairs, as evidenced by comparatively high levels of volunteering, voting, and engagement with local or school politics.— Mar 2012
